A NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

November marks the halfway point in our regular performance year which, as many of you know, runs from May 1st, 2021 to April 30th, 2022. It's a strange little month, taking place between some of our biggest conferences and events.

Within the next week or so, we'll provide a Mid-Year Update to the National Library of Medicine about what we've done and what we plan to do by the end of the year. We'll also be releasing our grants, including a brand-new **Tribal Health Information Outreach Award**.

But given the recent holiday weekend, I'd rather talk about what I'm thankful for—namely, the fantastic group of talented individuals who have come together to ramp up our Region 3 offerings and services to make an impact on this new seven-state region. I'll let some of our stats illustrate our progress:

- Reached <u>over 1,300 participants</u> (including international attendees from Canada and Egypt) and in <u>21 different types of programs</u> since May 2021
- Calculated reach of all communications (lists, social media, etc.) is <u>around</u> <u>116,000 direct receivers</u>
- Developed and began new offerings around LIS Engagement (Internships & Outreach Mentoring), Community Health Workers (Continuing Education Credits), and Data Science (Education and Consulting)

We don't do it alone. It's with all of your help and support, whenever you connect us to new colleagues or help promote our free programs to your organizations and partners. And for that, I am also thankful for all of you.

As always—and I'm probably a broken record at this point—we serve at your discretion and we'd love to hear from you. 

Kansas Library Association Announces Health and Wellness Grant Recipients



The Kansas Library Association (KLA) awarded nine libraries funding for projects to support library staff health and wellness at the annual KLA Conference, October 29, 2021 in Wichita, KS.

This grant was made possible through a gift from the Kansas Health Foundation to KLA in 2019. Part of the funding was granted to libraries to provide marketing and technology for online summer reading programs when COVID-19 affected traditional face to face events during the summer of 2020. The remaining funds supported the Health and Wellness Grant.


NNLM Region 3 Public Libraries - How Do They Stack Up?
