


PNC-MLA Health Equity and Diversity Speaker webinar series.

Being an NNLM Region 3 student awardee and attending the SCC MLA conference was such a worthwhile experience, especially for helping to shape my understanding of what I want to do with my future! Before I attended the conference, I had known I wanted to go into health sciences librarianship of some kind, but I felt a bit clueless about how to broach the topic of entering into the field. In addition to this, I knew very few people who worked in that capacity, and thus felt I did not have much help or guidance I could turn to if I had questions or needed resources in regard to health sciences librarianship.



One of the most amazing things about SCC MLA was the community of attendees: everyone was warm and welcoming to one another—especially to newcomers. I met so many kind, friendly people who were more than willing to talk about how they entered the health sciences librarianship field and their career progression, as well as offering advice on securing a future job, the interview process, guidance on writing a presentable resume and cover letter, and more. I was paired with an excellent mentor, Emily Glenn, dean of the Leon S. McGoogan Health Sciences Library at the University of Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha. The NNLM Region 3 office provided us with three books that, together with current events in our libraries and states and our professional experiences, shaped our bi-weekly Zoom discussions. These meetings were the backbone of our mentor/mentee relationship and set the tone for my site visit to the McGoogan Library in March. Emily and the readings helped me see what strengths I already had that would be helpful as a leader and areas for focused, intentional development.

Having the opportunity to travel to another library for a weeklong site visit was enriching for me. My entire library career has been at LSU Health Shreveport Library, although my job title and responsibilities have changed through the years. I have made site visits to other libraries, but no opportunity was quite as broad or in-depth as my visit to McGoogan. Emily and the other library faculty and staff shared with me generously and openly, and I learned a good deal from my visit. I sat in on a lot of meetings, asked lots of questions, and came back to Louisiana with new ideas on everything from library services to physical space to job titles and work roles.

In April, Emily and I both had a site visit at University of North Texas Health Science Center in Fort Worth, the host institution for NNLM Region 3. We visited with library staff at the Gibson D. Lewis Library and received an in-depth look into the workings of the NNLM. We also met with the campus's Vice President of Culture and Experience, who provided insight into the values that shape campus experience. We rounded out our site visit with the librarians at John Peter Smith Hospital, which has a partnership with the Lewis Library. This site visit was also a tremendous opportunity to ask questions and come back with insights into what a library can offer and the value of partnerships.

I encourage any mid-career librarian seeking to develop their leadership skills to pursue this award. The experience exceeded my expectations and forged new relationships with my mentor and with past Emerging Leader and Leadership Pathways awardees.
